- 4. The table below shows the number of admissions where Endometriosis is the primary diagnosis. 'Yes' means they have had a procedure/s which look likely to be related to their endometriosis e.g. freeing adhesions, ligaments, extirpation of lesions, resections, Ureterolysis, hysterectomy, salpingoophorectomy for ovary lesions etc.

'No' and 'blank' means it's unlikely they had treatment – e.g. no procedure recorded, or just a diagnostic procedure recorded.
